FUTURE FORMS

WILL, GONG TO, PRESENT CONTINUOUS

OLIVER AND ALFIE DECIDE TO ENTER A BIKE RACE.

We have different ways of talking about the future. We often use going to (+ infinitive), the present continuous (to be + -ing) or will (+ infinitive). The structure we use depends on the function of what we want to say, whether we are talking about arrangements, plans, predictions, etc.



EXAMPLES

- Oliver'll be back soon.
- We won't be ready.
- Do you think it'll rain this afternoon?

• (The doorbell rings) I'll get it.

• I'm sure you'll have a good time.

WILL / WON'T (= WILL NOT) + THE INFINITIVE

PREDICTIONS

- Oliver'll be back soon.
- We won't be ready.
- Do you think it'll rain this afternoon?

We also use: think, don't think, expect, be + sure.

I'm sure you'll have a good time.

WHEN WE DECIDE SOMETHING AT THE MOMENT OF SPEAKING

• (The doorbell rings) I'll get it.

GOING TO& PRESENT CONTINUOUS

WHAT DO THEY HAVE IN COMMON?

- Amy's coming round.
- We're going to watch a film want to join us?
- What are you doing this evening?

THEY ARE BOTH DECISIONS MADE BEFORE THE MOMENT OF SPEAKING

- Amy's coming round.
- We're going to watch a film want to join us?
- What are you doing this evening?

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE?

WHAT IS THE TENSE OF THESE SENTENCES?

• Amy's coming round.

Is this sentence correct?

• I'm cleaning my room tonight.

- Amy's going to come round.
- I'm going to clean my room tonight.

PRESENT CONTINUOUS&GOING TO

PRESENT CONTINUOUS= ARRANGEMENT

 Amy's coming round. (= arrangement between Amy and Daisy)

NO!!!

• I'm cleaning my room tonight. (It is incorrect!! It is not an arrangement)

GOING TO=INTENTION

- Amy's going to come round. (= Amy's intention)
- I'm going to clean my room tonight. (= intention)

ARE THESE SENTENCES CORRECT?

- 'I'm going to go to the cinema with Alex'
- 'I will go to the cinema with Alex'

ANSWER

'I'M GOING TO GO TO THE CINEMA WITH ALEX'

- Yes, that's correct. But we usually avoid saying going to go, just because it doesn't sound very elegant. We normally use the present continuous with go:
- I'm going to the cinema with Alex.

'I WILL GO TO THE CINEMA WITH ALEX'

NO!

We don't use will for arrangements or intentions if the decision was made before the moment of speaking.

IS THERE ANOTHER USE OF GOING TO

• 'Look out! You're going to spill that coffee.'

YES, THERE'S ANOTHER USE OF GOING TO!

PREDICTIONS

We use it for predictions too, especially when you can see something happening or about to happen.

• Look out! You're going to spill that coffee.

INTENTIONS

CAN YOU USE WILL&GOING TO FOR PREDICTIONS?

• I think the Green Party will win the election.

• I think the Green Party are going to win the election.

YES! SOMETIMES BOTH WILL AND GOING TO CAN BE USED.

- I think the Green Party will win the election.
- I think the Green Party are going to win the election.

PRESENT SIMPLE

CAN I USE PRESENT SIMPLE FOR FUTURE EVENTS?

- My plane leaves at 4pm tomorrow.
- The match starts at 8pm.

YES. YOU CAN USE PRESENT SIMPLE FOR TIMETABLED EVENTS.

- My plane leaves at 4pm tomorrow.
- The match starts at 8pm.
